The California Health Interview Survey (CHIS) released new data based on interviews with more than 44,000 households in California. The survey, conducted by the UCLA Center for Health Policy Research, covered hundreds of topics affecting state residents' health and well-being. Data on nearly 200 of these topics is available by state, region, county and some service-planning areas in Los Angeles and San Diego counties. [Details](#)

**Childhood Obesity Rates Drop in 18 States and One U.S. Territory**

A new report on obesity among preschool children enrolled in federal health and nutrition programs shows the nation is making important progress to reverse the epidemic. Among the places with declines, the U.S. Virgin Islands had the greatest decrease, from 13.6 percent in 2008 to 11 percent in 2011, and rates in Florida, Georgia, Missouri, New Jersey, and South Dakota dropped by at least one percentage point during that period. Rates remained stable in 20 states and Puerto Rico and increased in only three states - Colorado, Pennsylvania, and Tennessee. [Details](#)

Policy Updates



ENACT 2013 What's Next

August 28, 2013 | 10:00 AM - 12:00 PM

On June 5th, community members from across California attended ENACT 2013, an advocacy day in Sacramento aimed at educating legislators on important nutrition and physical activity policies impacting our communities, including Safe Routes to Schools, breast-feeding friendly hospitals, potential funding for parks, and nutrition training for child care providers. Join the webinar to discuss upcoming advocacy opportunities on these critical issues. Panelists will be discussing:

- Ways to promote a state or local soda tax
- Efforts to maintain Safe Routes to Schools
- Opportunities to engage in the national Farm Bill discussion, particularly on protecting SNAP. [Details](#)

MAP-21

In June of 2012 Congress passed the transportation bill, MAP-21, which consolidated Safe Routes to School into the Transportation Alternatives program (TAP). Nine months into implementation, 35 states have committed not to transfer money away from Transportation Alternatives, and 9 states will be adding money to TAP which increases opportunities for pedestrian and bicycle projects. Fifteen states plan to retain Safe Routes to School as a standalone program, 40 states will retain their Safe Routes to School coordinator and five states will pay for the required match for Safe Routes to School projects.
